





- In the Ukraine, if you find a spider web in the house on Christmas morning, it is believed to be a harbinger of good luck! There once lived a woman so poor, says a Ukrainian folk tale, that she could not afford Christmas decorations for her family. One Christmas morning, she awoke to find that spiders had trimmed her children's tree with their webs. When the morning sun shone on them, the webs turned to silver and gold. An artificial spider and web are often included in the decorations on Ukrainian Christmas trees.
- At Christmas, it is traditional to exchange kisses beneath the <u>mistletoe</u> tree. In ancient Scandinavia, mistletoe was associated with peace and friendship. That may account for the custom of "kissing beneath the mistletoe".
- 'Klaxon' is a name that does not belong to one of Santa's reindeer. A klaxon is actually a powerful electric horn. Its name comes from a German word meaning "shriek".
- In many households, part of the fun of eating Christmas pudding is finding a trinket that predicts your fortune for the coming year. For instance, finding a coin means you will become wealthy. A ring means you will get married; while a button predicts bachelorhood. The idea of hiding something in the pudding comes from the tradition in the Middle Ages of hiding a bean in a cake that was served on Twelfth Night. Whoever found the bean became "king" for the rest of the night.
- Frumenty was a spiced porridge, enjoyed by both rich and poor. It was a forerunner of modern Christmas puddings. It is linked in legend to the Celtic god Dagda, who stirred a porridge made up of all the good things of the earth.

- In Greek legend, malicious creatures called Kallikantzaroi sometimes play troublesome pranks at Christmas time. In order to get rid of them, salt or an old shoe is burnt. The pungent burning stench drives off, or at least helps discourage, the Kallikantzaroi. Other techniques include hanging a pig's jawbone by the door and keeping a large fire so they can't sneak down the chimney.
- The poinsettia is a traditional <u>Christmas</u> <u>flower</u>. In Mexico (its original birthplace), the poinsettia is known as the "<u>Flower</u> of the Holy Night".
- Louis Prang, a Bavarian-born lithographer who came to the USA from Germany in the 19th century, popularized the sending of printed Christmas cards. He invented a way of reproducing color oil paintings, the "chromolithograph technique", and created a card with the message "Merry Christmas" as a way of showing it off.
- The "Urn of Fate" is part of the Christmas celebrations in many Italian households. The Urn of Fate is brought out on Christmas Eve. It holds a wrapped present for everyone. The mother tries her luck first, then the others in turn. If you get a present with your name on it, you keep it; otherwise, you put it back and try again.
- In Sweden, a common Christmas decoration is the Julbukk, a small figurine of a goat. It is usually made of straw. Scandinavian Christmas festivities feature a variety of straw decorations in the form of stars, angels, hearts and other shapes, as well as the Julbukk.

# **Christmas Superstitions**

Cast: Group of Cubs, den leader, Scout staff with sprig of evergreen lashed to the top; materials to make snipping and sawing sounds (You can prerecord these on a cassette tape.)

**Setting**: Den leader is on stage; the Cubs are off to the side. Two Cubs enter.

Cub #1: Go ask the den leader how this tree is supposed to look.

Cub #2 goes to leader, acts out asking question. Leader acts out response. The Cubs run off stage, and audience can hear the sounds of sawing. snipping etc.)

Cub #3: (Enters, goes to leader.) Like this? **Leader**: (Looks over at the Cubs who are positioned to let the leader see, but not the audience.) More off of this side. (Gestures Cub runs off stage.) (More sawing sounds are heard. Repeat this several times, with leader pointing and gesturing about different sides of the tree. Everyone is getting more and more tired. Finally after many sounds of sawing and snipping the Cubs all march over to the leader, carrying the staff with the sprig attached to the top, and show it to the leader and the audience. Leader groans and all leave.)

Cub 1: 1 cup Friendly Words


Cub 2: 2 heaping cups Understanding

Cub 5: 1 dash Gentle Humor Cub 6: 1 pinch Spice of Life Cub 7: 1 drop Warm Personality

Narrator: Measure words carefully. Add cups of understanding to milk of human kindness. Stir together three times to make a smooth paste. Cook with gas on the front burner. Keep temperature low so it never boils over. Season with gentle humor, warm personality and spice of life. Serve in individual molds. Works best with a good mixer.

To add interest: Use a large kettle and add ingredients that have been written on cards as someone reads recipe. Use a big spoon to stir.



- 1. Poke a pair of holes in one side of two of the cans, 1/2" from the lip In a third can, poke two pairs of holes opposite each other. Set these cans next to each other, with the third can in the center. Wire them together as shown.
- 2. Set two more cans on top of the three, and one can on top of the two. Crumple a large piece of aluminum foil, smooth it out somewhat and wrap it around entire tree of cans, leaving can openings uncovered.
- 3. For each candle, fill a baby food jar almost to

the top with water. Add food coloring to water. Fill the remainder of the jar with cooking oil which will float on top.

4. Cut a small square of foil and poke a small hole in center. Thread wick through the hole, crushing the foil tightly around center of wick. Cut another piece of foil and thread bottom of wick through top of foil as shown.

- 5. Set foil and wick in each baby food jar. They will float on top of water. Set one jar candle in each coffee can.
- 6. The candles will remain lit as long as there is oil to burn. When the oil runs out, add more.


# Webelos Scientist By Heart of America Council Flying Saucer

#### **Materials:**

Plastic lid (from a cottage cheese container) Screw spout (from a detergent bottle that opens and closes by pulling up and down) Large balloon

Glue

Cut a hole in the center of the plastic lid, just a little smaller than the detergent lid. Glue the detergent lid (screw side down) over the hole. Make sure that the detergent lid is closed. Blow up the balloon. Place the open neck of the balloon over the top of the closed detergent lid. Gently pull the detergent lid while the balloon is still on it. The pressure of the air going out of the balloon will make the lid sail like a flying saucer.

Popcorn & oil


Small block of wood

Plastic Bottle Bird Feeder

#### **Materials:**

Scrap lumber

Drill

Sand paper

Nails

Plastic lid 3" diameter

2 Clear 22 oz. plastic bottles

Tack

Tapered bottle cap

1. Cut 3/4" scrap lumber for the back and base of the feeder. The back is 3" x 12" and the

base is 3"x3 1 12"

2. Drill a hole in the top of the back piece for hanging.


3. Sand the pieces until smooth and nail the two together.

4. Stain, use several coats of varnish, or paint with exterior paint.

5. Nail an inverted plastic lid, about 3" in diameter, to the base.

6. Place the bottle in position so the mouth of the bottle is level with the top edge of the plastic lid, and measure. Cut two strips,

1/ 2" wide and the required length, from a second plastic bottle.



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wo strips to one side of the back (so the bottom strip will be at the narrow part of the bottle). Position the bottle and tack the other ends of the strips in place.

7. Cut a hole in the top of the feeder to fit the small end of a tapered bottle cap; invert the cap and use as a cork. To fill~ the feeder, remove the cap.

#### **Nail Maze**

#### Materials:

2 Pieces 1/2" plywood (20" x 20")

1/2 Pound of flat top nails (1" long)

1 Screw (1 3/4" long) with wing nut

2 Small pieces of wood (1/2" thick)

to fit between plywood boards

2 Hangers

Steel ball bearings

Hammer

**Pliers** 

Yardstick

Pencil


**Paints** 

Brushes

Compass with pencil

With pencil and yardstick, divide one piece of plywood into pie-shaped sections. Make seven circles 1" apart with the compass and pencil. Drill a hole in the very center of each board for the screw. Attach the two hangers in the board without the drawing. Copy the pattern of the nails as shown. Hammer in nails, 3/16" apart, starting at the center and moving outward. Keep nail straight and at the same height. Paint the board and nails. When finished nailing the maze, place the two pieces of wood between the boards. Put the screw through the center holes of both boards. Then attach and tighten the wing nut, so that the boards will stay in

To play: Place a ball bearing on the nails somewhere near the top. Try to get the ball to roll all the way down to the pocket at the bottom.





Old Fashioned Lamps

#### Materials:

Aluminum pop cans

Plastic bottle caps

Epoxy glue

Shear

Work gloves

Tape

Hammer & Nail

Spray paint (metallic or flat black)

Foil pan

Orangewood stick

14 Gauge wire

# **High-Backed Lamp:**

Cut a pot can, as shown. From around the sides of another can, cut a handle 1" x 6". Bend the ends of the handle for tabs and insert the tabs through slits cut in the back of the holder; glue on the inside. To hide the tabs, line the inside of the lamp with a piece cut form a foil pan. Rub the foil with an range wood stick to press out any design. Glue the foil in place, taping until dry.


# Simple Lamp:

For the base, cut a pop can down to 1" high; tape cut edge and invert. From the cutoff sides of the can, cut a 1" strip for a handle. Curl one end of the strip and insert the other end through a slit cut in the base; bend the end on the inside of the base and tape.


High-backed

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(14 yauye), each 10 long.

Bend the wires, as shown, leaving 1" straight at the bottom and curving the top around a large thread spool. To insert the bottom of each wire, punch 2 holes in the base; bend the end of the wire up to the inside after inserting it. Space the wires evenly around the base of the lamp. Cut slits around the base, about 1" apart, between the wires. Cut another can down to about 2 ½"high; weight with stones. Push the base inside the weighted can, squeezing the slit sides together for a snug fit. Glue cord around the top edge to cover any exposed part of the slit base. For the top of the lamp, use an inverted foil pot pie pan. Cut out a 1" circle in the top. Punch four evenly spaced holes above the rim. Insert the wires through the holes and re-curve the ends, if necessary.

From around the sides of a can, cut 1" x 5" strips to curl and glue around the bottom of the lamp for decoration. Place the candle in the holder, so the top of the candle is at least 3 1/2" from the pot pie pan to prevent smoking.
